

# Sasquatch Return Frightens Indians In British Columbia

VANCOUVER, B. C.—(TP)—The Sasquatch is back again.

All through the Harrison river valley Indians are excitedly discussing the reappearance of the legendary hairy giant of the mountains.

Three canoes of Indians arrived terror-stricken at Harrison Hot Springs after a flight from Fort Douglas at the head of the lake. They announced that the Sasquatch is on the rampage.

Jimmy Douglas and his family were among those who say they saw the monster. They claimed that the Sasquatch was at least 14 feet tall, about twice as tall as the average member of his so-called "species."

Prof. J. W. Burns, who has made a study of Sasquatch lore, believes that it is quite possible that the giant was the same one who was sighted a week previously at Ruby Creek, 40 miles away.

The Indians are very sure that it wasn't a big bear they saw. They said the creature walked on two legs like a man.

# Council Sets Aside \$5000 for Pipe

expense in purchasing the said pipe and that apparently the city was going to abandon the use of it and such abandonment would cause his company financial loss. He didn't explain what had induced his company to purchase the pipe for the use of the city and who it was that gave him any assurance that this type of pipe would be used. He stated that the price the pipe could be purchased from his concern would be considerably less than the city could purchase it on the market.

**Army Uses No Conduits**

A check of the airport project in which the pipe would be utilized as conduit revealed that the CAA engineers originally planned a two phase electrical system which would require conduit. They later changed the system to a one phase circuit and planned the installation without conduit.

Army engineers and CAA engineers do not use conduit in similar projects in other parts of the nation because they state with apparently sound engineering knowledge that such conduit is unnecessary.

Thus, the city council apparently authorized the expenditure of \$5000 of city money for which no responsible party concerned in the project including the CAA and the Army would request or certify as being needed. If the only reason for such appropriation was to take off of L. B. Marsh Electric company's hands the results of an unwise purchase, the private electrical concern accomplished a master stroke of business which cost the taxpayers \$5000 for what appears to be convenient face-saving bit of boondoggling for Mr. Jones and the company he represents, sole benefit.

**Klockslem Opposed**

The minutes of the council meeting at which the fantastic deal was approved states that eight councilmen approved the measure with William Brunton absent. This too is strange as Councilman Klockslem and Freeman were absent at the time the vote was taken and it is known that Klockslem is opposed to the purchase.

Even more revealing is Mr. Jones' statement at the council

meeting when the question of bids was discussed. Laughingly Mr. Jones, explained that after all, his company had sold the city thousands and thousands of dollars of electrical equipment without any bids being called for and that the point was without merit. This again threw into sharp highlight the consistent evasion of the city charter intent on the purchase of city materials and perhaps explains to some extent why certain favored firms enjoy an almost water tight monopoly of city business.

**Newcomb Asks Purchase**

Mr. Otis Newcomb, city electrician, who almost without exception throughout his long career with the city has favored the use of the more expensive types of electric equipment recommended the purchase of the pipe. Mr. Newcomb is also author of one of the most monumental electrical codes in the entire United States, a colossal document of more than 400 pages which dwells almost too painstakingly on certain types of expensive and fancy electrical equipment.

Mr. George Baker, director of Public Service, appeared to advise the council that he recommended the use of the pipe but that the CAA didn't expect to use pipe conduit.

**Make Appropriation**

But in spite of and because of all this Councilman Ford moved, seconded by Councilman Fletcher that the city manager consult with the CAA in order to "induce them to use transite" pipe and that the city will provide \$5000 as the sponsor's share.

Mayor Gentry took occasion to state to the council:

"It would be unwise and expensive not to use conduits." Of course, the Army and the CAA with vast experience throughout the entire country in such matters do not think it necessary.

The points not clear are these: What did Mr. Jones refer to when he said the specifications required the use of transite pipe? Were specifications drawn for this project that were made available to private companies before bids were advertised? If this were done who was responsible and why is not an investigation ordered into this irregular and illegal proceeding?

Why was Mr. Jones so confident that transite pipe alone would be used?

Why did Mr. Jones express the belief no bids would be necessary?

Finally, why did the council make the appropriation in the face

of CAA, Army and the city manager's not recommending such pipe? Is the council establishing a policy of underwriting the purchases of materials by private companies and guaranteeing them against loss? Such are the questions the citizens of Long Beach would like answered.

# If Russ Invasion Mirrored on U.S. Map Nazis Would Be in Indianapolis

WASHINGTON.—(TP)—If today's war front in Russia were mirrored on a map of the United States—that is, with the American east corresponding to the Russian west—the position of the battle lines and occupied regions in terms of United States geography would reveal certain striking similarities between the two countries.

Roughly measuring invaded Soviet territory against the eastern United States will show to what a considerable extent American economic geography reads like Russian.

In terms of this relocation, how nearly would the losses of natural and industrial resources in the United States match those which the Soviet Union has suffered to date? And for continuing the battle, what wealth of field and factory would be left to the United States as compared with that now remaining to Russia?

On our artificial "transfer" map of the United States, Moscow would coincide roughly with Indianapolis. Leningrad would find its closest counterpart in New York City, and the hotly-contested Donets basin front would be reflected approximately in East Texas.

The mighty 600-mile push of the German armies almost to Moscow, the Soviet capital, would be mirrored by penetration from the Atlantic coast about to Indianapolis, important industrial city and capital of Indiana. Washington is less than 150 miles inland from the Atlantic coast. For purposes of

this contrast it is to be assumed that the government would long since have been moved to a temporary situation somewhere west of the occupied regions. Kansas City would match in location the new emergency Soviet administrative center at Kuibyshev on the Volga.

In position and in importance to their respective countries, New York and Leningrad have many resemblances. Each is normally its nation's leading port and each has important munitions and other defense-vital industries, shipyards and trade offices.

As the German forces have made their deepest thrusts in the south 800 miles across the Ukraine to the major Russian industrial region of the Donets basin, so fighting would have reached eastern Texas and America's most productive oil fields if the front were transposed to the southern United States.

# Potato Treatment For Shellshock Told

MINNEAPOLIS—(TP)—English doctors faced with the exigencies of war rationing have substituted potatoes for sugar as part of the insulin treatment of war neuroses, commonly called "shell shock," according to the current issue of Modern Medicine.

Potatoes or sugar are used to bring patients out of a coma induced by insulin injections. The injections "shock" the nervous system and help to remove the psychic symptoms, which are produced in civilians subject to the noise and concussion of bursting shells and bombs and the fear and terror induced by air raids.

Two English doctors, Dr. William Sargent and Dr. Nellie Craike, report that by substituting potatoes for sugar to interrupt the insulin "shock," they have been able to simplify treatment and reduce dosages of the precious insulin. The potatoes also help the neurotic and exhausted patients to put on weight without resorting to forced feeding.
