She stressed the use of some object, perhaps a slip cover, chair or sofa or even the design on a set of dishes as the key to use when selecting colors for a room. Mrs. Rohrkaste said to select the design and echo the color as a design on a set of dishes might be pink roses with yellow centers and green leaves on an ivory porcelain. The wall paper might be a stripe of pink, the woodwork ivory, soft green floor covering and crisp white organdy curtains. She said that rough textured fabrics and wall finishes blend with modern furniture, heavy heavy pottery and plain silver while the satins and the elegant rich colored brocades are shown best when used with cut glass. "If I keep on with my job after marriage will my marriage have as good a chance for success as it would if I gave up the job and settled down to full-time homemaking?"
The reader who sends me that question is smart, for she is facing her problem before marriage instead of afterwards.
The answer to her question is, "Yes—if..." But a great deal of consideration should be given to the "ifs" involved.
If the husband has no objections to his wife's working. Combining marriage and a job is difficult at best. It is much too difficult if the husband is antagonistic toward the demands the job makes on his wife.
If the wife has the physical stamina to do two jobs without slighting either. All too often when the wife cannot handle both jobs well, she neglects her marital responsibilities and tells herself, "Well, I can't do everything."
If the husband's job doesn't necessitate a great deal of entertaining and an active social life. If it does, then the working wife is going to find it difficult to entertain with the ease and graciousness of the wife who is a full-time homemaker. She will be at a disadvantage there simply because she hasn't the time to devote to entertaining that other wives have.
If the couple realizes from the start that the wife's earnings should be counted out when they are setting up their standards of living. Too many couples ignore this rule and then are miserable when they have to reduce their living standards when a baby comes along and the wife has to give up her job. Or else they may put off starting a family because they hate to change the way of living they have established on two pay checks.
If the wife will look on her job as a job rather than as a career.

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
