



### Abominable Open Season

Is an "Abominable Snowman" fair game in California? We'll have to cross that bridge when somebody finds one, State Atty. Gen. Stanley Mosk decided yesterday.

Mosk and his aides have been delving into the subject since receiving a query from J. M. Etchart of Oroville.

"If I am able to get one of these animals," he asked, "will I be able to keep him or will it be taken away? Mosk's task was made more difficult because whoever composed the Fish and Game regulations lacked the foresight to make a provision for any kind of snowmen, let alone abominable ones.

Nor do the regulations have anything to say about the snow man's aliases — such as "Bigfoot" in the Humboldt mountain area, "Sasquatch" in Canada, and "Yeti" in the Himalayas.

"You'll have to catch him first," Mosk wrote to Etchart, "then we can see what section of the code he comes under."

If it was any consolation, Mosk added, Etchart can catch all of the moles, opossums, rats, mice, gophers, muskrats, beavers, coyotes, weasels, skunks, cougars, and bobcats that he stumbles on while looking for the snow man.

The Fish and Game people won't give it a thought.

### Graduation and Probation

LEWISTON, Idaho, May 27 — There will be a minimum amount of graduation glory for a trio of Lewiston, Idaho, high school seniors today.

The three will get their diplomas after they make an appearance in police court on petty larceny charges. They admitted they swiped the big English exam Wednesday night.

An officer spotted the boys near the school, stopped to check them and found the school had been entered and the English exam was in one of the boys' car.

Some 245 other Lewiston High seniors who took the English exam yesterday stepped forward in cap and gown last night to receive their diplomas.

The school board ruled that Marvin L. Peterson, Richard H. Baker and Eric Hayes, all 18, will get their diplomas with little pomp and unusual circumstance.

### Bamboozling at Stanford

REDWOOD CITY, May 27 — Three Stanford University students were ordered to knock off the bamboozling yesterday.

That means no more bamboo and no more booze—nor anything alcoholic for that matter.

The trouble started when Leland Dale Stephenson, 19, Thomas Jay Darrah, 20, and Garry Lee Reid, 20, succumbed to a new campus rage—drinking the foam from bamboo beer mugs.

They obtained the bamboo at the home of James Goldman of Atherton—without Goldman's permission. Police caught them with bamboo and saws in hand.

Municipal Judge Frank Comaich fined the boys \$25 each and placed them on six months' probation, during which time they are "to quit drinking."

### The Court's Wedding Gift

WASHINGTON, May 27 — (AP)—The sign said no parking between the hours of 4 and 6:30 p.m.

James F. Barrett's watch said 3:30 p.m., so he parked and took his bride, Martha Anne, to a restaurant for a quick snack.

The couple returned 20 minutes later to find a ticket on the car.

In court yesterday, Barrett explained that he and Mrs. Barrett had driven to the Nation's capital from Richmond, Va., to begin their honeymoon.

He forgot, he told Municipal Court Judge Catherine B. Kelly, that Washington was on daylight saving time and Richmond on standard time. Which meant his watch was an hour slow here.

The judge fined Barrett \$10 for the offense — but then gave him a wedding present by suspending it.

### Ear-Witnesses to a Crime

NEW YORK, May 27 — (AP)—Blind workers making vallets and other handicraft products at the Associated Blind Agency couldn't see why their products kept disappearing, so they rigged a sound trap.

The blind artisans kept an ear cocked as they toiled leather goods and stitched clothing. A buzzer had been attached to the storeroom door.

Hundreds of dollars of clothes, toys, leather goods and other products had been stolen in the past six months from the storeroom. The blind value their labors, the pretty things they make but can't see.

Yesterday the buzzer rang loud and clear as a dozen blind workers were in the office. Their director, Irving Selis, also blind, picked up the phone and called police.

All the blind artisans waited with their hearing alert.

They heard police pound up the stairs to the second floor and then loud voices. Police arrested Joseph Martin, 27, in the act of stuffing clothing into a bag. He was holding another bag full of wallets.

Police said Martin had jimmed the storeroom door with a knife. They charged him with burglary and possession of burglary tools.

They also began a check of 12 pawn tickets found in his pocket.
